Introduction

This book tells the story of the Cassidys of Cassidy Lake from roots in Ireland, to the homestead at Cassidy Lake, New Brunswick, to the far corners of Canada and the United States. We've taken the material from earlier publications of the family history, reworked it, and added some interesting new insights.

Assembling your family tree is one of those fun pastimes that never ends. Not only are there new branches as families grow, there are always details of the past to discover. Documenting the genealogy of the Cassidys of Cassidy Lake got underway in earnest in 1949 as part of the celebration of the renovation and rededication of the little white church at Cassidy Lake.

That first family history and genealogy published in 1949 was the result of the labors of Clara Ann Cassidy MacDowell [52], Robert Allen Cassidy [58], Francis Jane Cassidy [59], and Matthew Richard Cassidy [54]. It listed eighteen families of the first two generations and included one and a half pages of history narrative. Through the efforts of countless family members over nearly 60 years, the genealogy record has grown to over 1200 individuals representing over 300 families. The history narrative has also grown to where it now is an entire book.

Website www.cassidys.ca was established to make this information more accessible. In addition to genealogical records, it has a video library and high resolution images of the pictures and graphics in this book.

A number in brackets [] after a family member name is the genealogy record number from the database at www.cassidys.ca.



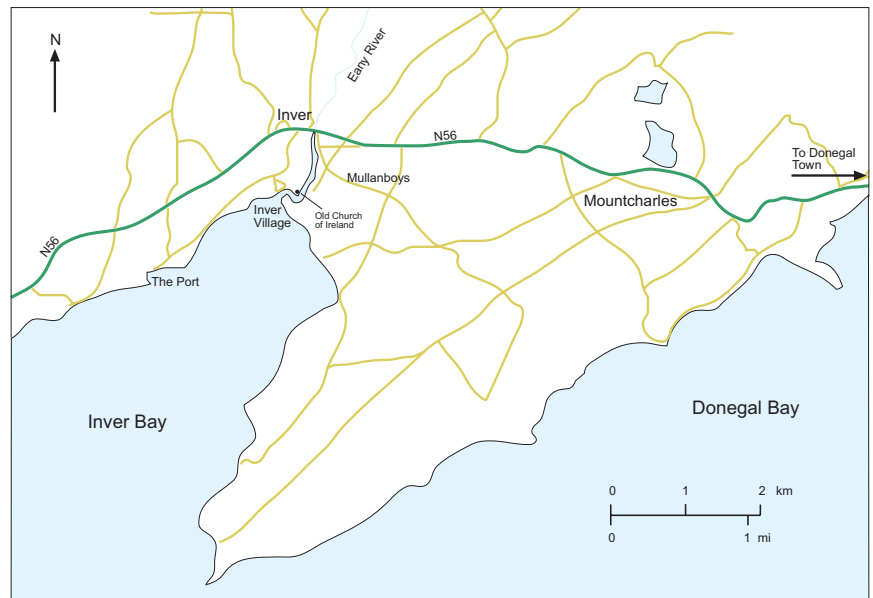
1. Irish Roots

Our story begins in The Port, County Donegal, Ireland with William Cassidy [1] who would one day become the patriarch of the Cassidys of Cassidy Lake. William was born in The Port in 1797, the eldest of ten children of Andrew and Margaret Cassidy. He grew up in a modest stone cottage and married Jane Milligan, also of The Port. Together they emigrated to Canada in 1819. Jimmy Henderson, now of Donegal Town, who is related to the Cassidys and possibly to William Cassidy, grew up across the road from the Cassidy cottage and remembers it well.

Mike Cassidy [317] has done extensive research on the Cassidy home in The Port. It was a small two-story Irish cottage probably less than 20 ft. x 20 ft. It was torn down around 1980. Jimmy says it was the last home on the left hand side of the road down to the port. By 1999, this property which had no water or sewage, had sold for a mere 8,000 Irish Punts, or about \$16,000. Next door there is a large modern bungalow with workspace for fishing gear.

The Port, County Donegal

The Port is a small, 107 acre, townland in the Parish of Inver situated on Inver Bay about 7 miles from Donegal Town (see map on page 4). In 2005 it consisted of about 50 houses and a few commercial buildings, most of which appear to support the local fishing industry. There is little indication that the town was ever much larger.

The Eany River empties into Inver Bay at Inver Village and The Port is 1.2 miles (1.9 km) southwest along Inver Bay. From a history of Ardaghey¹, one of the four Catholic church areas that make up the Parish of Inver, we learn that historically The Port was not a prosperous area. The Fisheries Commission of 1836 describes the pier as being “neglected and is now in total ruin.” In the 1860s nearby Inver Village is described as bearing the “unmistakable marks of decay” and “following up this old broken road, we arrive at another decayed village called ‘The Port’.”

Today, as with most of Ireland, The Port appears to be relatively prosperous with a number of new middle and upper income homes. While the access road is little more than a laneway, it is in respectable repair. There are several commercial fishing boats that use The Port. Recently, to the dismay of some of the residents due to the resulting pollution, salmon fish farms have been established in Inver Bay. While The Port is a fishing village, the Cassidys were carpenters and, according to Jimmy Henderson, would not have been engaged in commercial fishing.

Inver is often called Invermayle. St. Natalis, who died in 563, was Abbot of a monastery here. In 1821, the entire county of Donegal had a population of 248,270 and the Inver area had a population of 11,785. Today there are two “Invers” within a mile or so of each other. There is the town of Inver situated on the main highway, N56, just west of the Enay River, and Inver Village which is located right on Inver Bay on the west bank of the Eany River. The Port is southwest of Inver Village along Inver Bay.

A landmark of interest is the Church of Ireland where William and Jane Cassidy were married in 1818. This church is in Mullanboys on the east side of the Eany River. The former parish church was

Irish Geographic Descriptors

It helps to have an understanding of the Irish system of geographic descriptors: provinces, counties, parishes, and townlands. Ireland is made up of four provinces (Connacht, Leinster, Munster and Ulster) and 32 counties. Of the nine counties that make up the province of Ulster, six are in Northern Ireland and three, Donegal, Monaghan and Cavan, are in the Irish Republic. A townland is the smallest unit of land area identified in records and named on maps. Its size can vary from less than ten acres to thousands of acres. There are about 64,000 townlands in Ireland. Civil parishes usually contain 25 to 30 townlands as well as towns and villages. There are church parishes as well as civil parishes. Boundaries for the Church of Ireland parishes are usually the same as civil parish boundaries. Catholic church parishes are usually larger and encompass parts of more than one civil parish. A Catholic parish may be divided into church areas.

For the Inver area, the parish boundaries are the same for the Church of Ireland and the Catholic church. The Catholic church parish of Inver is divided into four church-areas: Frosses, Drimarone, Mountcharles and Ardaghey. The Port is in the Ardaghey church-area. When performing Cassidy research in this area, one should look under the Diocese of Raphoe, Parish of Inver. Since a parish is a large area, it is best to narrow one's search to the townland if possible.

located on the west bank of the Eany River near Inver Village. It was abandoned around 1805 when the current Church of Ireland was built. There is an old cemetery on the site of the original Church of Ireland that is very hard to find. It does contain a Cassidy gravestone.²

If you visit the area, you will also find the Inver Methodist Church, located just east of the Eany River in Mullanboys. It was built in 1881 long after William Cassidy lived there. While the church that

William helped establish at Cassidy Lake was also a Methodist church, we have no reason to believe William had any connection with Methodism in Ireland.

Ancient Irish Ancestors

Historically, Celtic peoples were innovators in areas like iron working, mining, agriculture, and trade. One thing they were not was nation builders. Their main accomplishment in this aspect seems to have been interference with the great nation builders: Rome, Britain, France and Spain.

The Cassidy name (Ó Caiside in Irish) can be traced in Ireland to the twelfth century AD. All Cassidys originate from County Fermanagh in Ulster (Northern Ireland), which is immediately southeast of County Donegal (see map on page 2.) The Cassidy Clan has a rich and proud heritage. The fact that the Cassidy name shows up in history says something about their stature. Their primary claim to fame is as physicians to the Maguires from 1320 to 1504. The Maguires were of

the ruling (warlord) class. Thomas O'Cassidy was the last known hereditary member of the clan and a medical practitioner. He is the author of a paper from around 1504 entitled *The Nature and Cure of the Different Diseases on the Human Frame*.³

While the Cassidys were not of the ruling class of society, they were sufficiently important and successful to have their own coat of arms. Their notoriety unfortunately would have made them vulnerable to the conquering English. It seems the Irish warlords were never able to get along with the English invaders. During the 1690-1830 period the English, through oppression and penal laws, wiped out many famous Irish families. The Cassidys likely suffered greatly during this period.



Drawing a definitive line between ourselves and our ancient ancestors is virtually impossible. The fact that we can trace back to 1762 to William's father Andrew Cassidy is quite an accomplishment. For now, the most we can say is that we are all related to these ancient Cassidys.

The official Cassidy Clan website www.cassidyclan.org has an authoritative history of the origins of the Cassidy Clan in Ireland. Readers are encouraged to visit that website for additional details.

We are fortunate in our ancestral search to know the location where William was born and raised. This narrows the scope of the search considerably. Records from earlier than the 1800s are very limited.

Though our William Cassidy was from The Port in County Donegal, his roots will eventually lead to County Fermanagh. Therefore, in searching for ancestral clues, one needs to include County Fermanagh and surrounding areas along with The Port, Inver Parish, and County Donegal.

2. Cassidy Lake

Europeans first settled in New Brunswick in 1611. These first settlers were French and the area was part of what the French called Acadia. The Acadians' fortunes suffered after France was defeated at Quebec and ceded the territory to the English. In 1754 the English demanded an oath of allegiance. Many Acadians refused and in the subsequent years they were expelled and their lands confiscated.¹ Thus we have the start of English crown grants in New Brunswick .

The American Revolutionary War led to many English loyalists leaving the United States for Canada. Many came to Saint John in the period from 1781-1783 and were important in the development of the newly created Province of New Brunswick that had separated from Nova Scotia in 1784. Most inhabitants lived near waterways from which they derived their livelihood. The less accessible inland areas were just waiting to be tilled by energetic and resourceful people.

This was the milieu that William and Jane found when they landed in Saint John in 1819. Certainly they found more peaceful surroundings here than those in County Donegal which was fraught with frantic and constant political upheavals and sparse agricultural conditions. In all likelihood, their motivation to emigrate would have been primarily looking for an opportunity to escape English oppression. They would not have received any encouragement, grant, or financial support from the English crown. Given that there was probably little future for William and Jane in Ireland, Canada would appear as a land of opportunity.

Locating Cassidy Lake

Cassidy Lake and the site of the family homestead are located in southern New Brunswick. They are 30 miles (50 km) from Saint John, 50 miles (80 km) from Moncton and 80 miles (130 km) from the provincial capital Fredericton. On a finer scale, they are 9 miles (14 km) from the town of Norton and 15 miles (24 km) from Sussex, both of which are the nearest major population centers.

The way to the lake is over county roads. The most common route is from Highway 1 at Sussex via County Road 111. The Sussex road, until the Norton road was paved in 2001, was generally in better condition, especially in the springtime. The homestead site is on the north side of the lake, facing south and directly overlooking the church. The church is located on the narrow strip of land between the county road and the lake.

Assembling the Homestead Property

In 1825 William established a permanent homestead on 150 acres at DeForest Lake, 30 miles (48 km) from Saint John. The area was not totally virgin as Samuel DeForest had settled on the south side of the lake 28 years earlier in 1797. Brian Cassidy [125] has traced the extent and ownership of the Cassidy property at Cassidy Lake through records in the New Brunswick Provincial Archives

An Overview

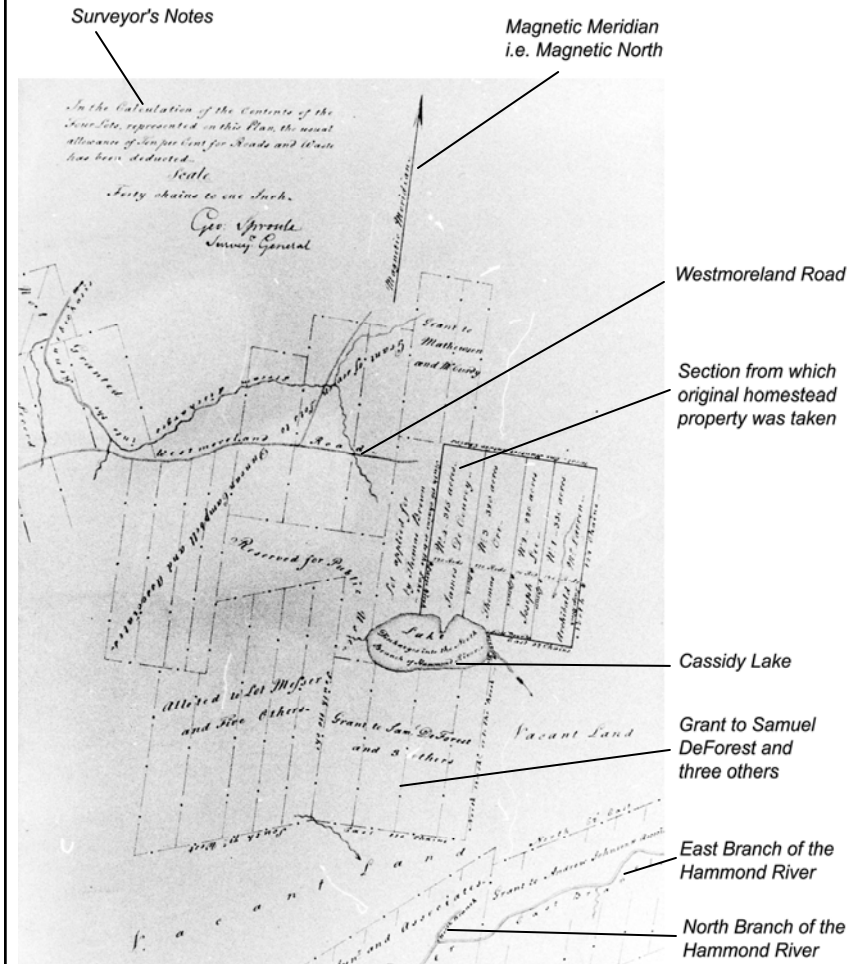
In May of 1815 we have the first survey of the Cassidy Lake area and transfer of property ownership to James DeCourcy by crown grant; a portion of which William Cassidy would eventually buy. In December of that same year, the DeCourcy property is sold to Elijah Baxter. Eight years later, in 1823, a 150 acre section of this land was purchased by William. The contract price for the property was £40 in New Brunswick currency, equivalent to about \$5,000 in today's dollars, payable in carpenter's work over six years at an annual rate of £6 15s (6 pounds 15 shillings). William had the option to pay off the debt sooner by completing work that Elijah Baxter wanted done. The penalty for not living up to the terms of the contract was considerable, £150.

Through a series of transactions over 17 years, William expanded the property to its maximum of 596 acres in 1850 when if we include the 80 acres deeded to each of sons, William Jr. [3] and James [4], in 1849. In 1849, William began divesting his holdings, passing the property on to various sons and other individuals. The largest section was deeded to son Francis Edward [9], who later passed it to his son Robert Allen [58], who in turn subdivided it and passed the portions on to his sons Stanley [120] and Gordon [121]. Stanley passed his property on to son Peter [124]. Gordon subdivided his portion and transferred it to sons Gordon [150] and Douglas [151]. The property willed to Peter and those properties owned by Gordon and Douglas are what remains in the Cassidy name today and totals 318 acres.

Transaction Details

The 1850 Property Map on page 14 shows the various parcels of land that William accumulated and disbursed. The table on page 16 is a summary of these transactions. Transcripts of original documents make for interesting reading. They are available online at www.cassidys.ca.

Crown Grant Survey Map of Cassidy Lake c. 1815



May 8, 1815 – Samuel DeForest Crown Grant² Samuel DeForest acquires property on south side of Cassidy Lake (1110 acres) by crown grant. This same grant allots adjacent properties to Nelson Nelson (300 acres), James Sederquest (300 acres) and William Sederquest (210 acres). The petition for this land was filed under the name James Sederquest on April 6, 1814. This crown grant is titled *Samuel DeForest and 3 Others, Parish of Hampton, Kings County*.

May 9, 1815 – James DeCourcy Crown Grant³ James DeCourcy acquires property on the north side of Cassidy Lake (315 acres) by crown grant. The survey map on page 10 is from the original Crown Grant document. By the early 1800s the area around Cassidy Lake was well surveyed. The note in the upper left-hand corner by the Surveyor General, George Sproule, is important. It reads:

In the Calculation of the Four Lots, represented on this Plan, the usual allowance on Ten per Cent for roads and Waste has been deducted. Scale: 40 chains to one inch.

The DeCourcy property was rectangular in shape with an area of 315 acres and measured 116 chains to the lake on the west side and 120 rods wide. [1 rod = 16.5 feet (5 m), 1 chain = 4 rods, 1 acre (0.4 ha) = 160 sq. rods]. In today's terminology the property was 7,656 feet (2,334 m) deep and 1980 feet (604 m) wide, or over a mile (0.68 km) deep and just under a half mile (0.3 km) wide.

Other notes of interest on the map are that the lake "Discharges into the North Branch of Hammond River." The irregular section of property at the west end of the lake is "Reserved for Public Use."

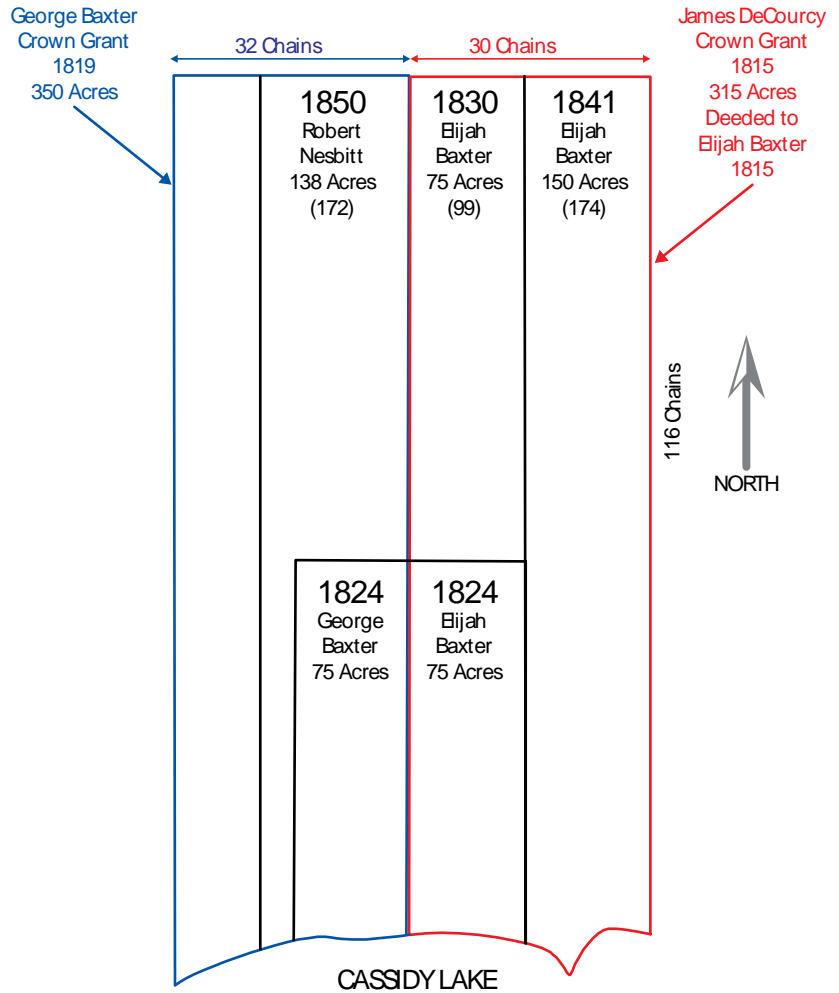
In this survey the lake is not named. From other sources, such as the 1862 map on page 20, we know that it was once called DeForest Lake, presumably after Samuel DeForest who owned the property along the south side of the lake. The naming of the lake is discussed later.

The same grant allots adjacent properties to Joseph Lee (220 acres), Archibald McLarren (1193 acres) and Thomas Orr (328 acres). The petition for this land, in the name of James DeCourcy, was signed on September 23, 1814 in Hampton, Kings County. This crown grant is titled *Archibald McLarren and 3 Others, Parishes of Hampton and Sussex, Kings County*.

December 23, 1815 – DeCourcy Property transferred to Elijah Baxter⁴ Only a few months after acquiring property on the north side of the lake, James DeCourcy sold it to Elijah Baxter. The deed gives a property size of *300 acres more or less*. The actual size is likely closer to 315 acres as shown in the 1815 crown grant.

This is the extent of William Cassidy's property in 1850. The numbers in parentheses represent the estimated size in acres when you include the allowance for roads and waste. (1 rod = 16.5 ft (5 m), 1 chain = 4 rods.)



July 6, 1819 – George Baxter Crown Grant⁵ In 1819, George Baxter acquired a 350 acre lot immediately to the west of the original DeCourcy property. This property is significant because two sections of it were acquired by William Cassidy; one in 1824 (75 acres) and another in 1850 (138 acres).

January 3, 1823 – William Cassidy contracts to purchase a portion of the DeCourcy property from Elijah Baxter⁶ This is a purchase agreement for a portion of land (150 acres) owned by Elijah Baxter for £40. While it is likely that this land lies completely or primarily within the DeCourcy grant, its precise location, stated as *40 Rods on Elijah Baxter and 30 Rods on Land granted to George Baxter from thence to extend back to complete the amount of 150 Acres*, is uncertain.

It appears that this contract was completed on June 9, 1824 with the formal property transfers from Elijah and George Baxter. Elijah Baxter must have been operating as an agent for George Baxter in this transaction. It's interesting to note that while the contract price for the properties was £40, the deed shows a total of £58. Why the difference we do not know. A better understanding of the property transaction process at that time should provide some clarification.

The original copy of this agreement is currently in the possession of Brian Cassidy. It is currently unknown if copies of this agreement exist elsewhere or if it was ever registered with provincial authorities.

June 9, 1824 – William Cassidy purchases 75 acres from Elijah Baxter and 75 acres from George Baxter⁷ These were two independent transactions conducted on the same day. Both properties were identical in size (75 acres) and the sum of money transferred the same (£29). The Elijah Baxter property was taken from the southwest corner of the original 315 acre DeCourcy grant. The George Baxter property was taken from the southeast corner of that 350 acre property which he had acquired by crown grant in 1819. Each section consisted of 15 chains of lakefront property and was 50 chains deep.

September 3, 1830 – William Cassidy purchases 75 acres from Elijah Baxter⁸ This deed is for 75 acres located, as best we can determine, in the northwest section of the original DeCourcy property. It is interesting to note that this deed was not registered until February 27, 1841, the same date on which the next deed (dated January 6, 1841) between Elijah Baxter and William Cassidy was registered. According to crown grant survey maps, the true size of this lot was approximately 99 acres.

Cassidy Lake Property Transactions by William Cassidy

Transactions by which William Cassidy acquired and disposed of property on the north side of Cassidy Lake. The section deeded to son Francis Edward Cassidy in 1868 plus the section deeded to William Kirkpatrick in 1872 (which Francis Edward reacquired in 1875) is the property which remains in the Cassidy name today.

January 6, 1841 – William Cassidy purchases 150 acres from Elijah Baxter⁹ This transaction is for 150 acres located on the eastern side of the original DeCourcy property. With this deed, the Cassidy property had expanded to include all the land in the original DeCourcy property (315 acres) plus 75 acres of adjacent property to the west. According to crown grant survey maps, the true size of this lot was approximately 174 acres.

July 18, 1849 – William Cassidy transfers 80 acres to each of sons William Jr. and James A.

June 1, 1850 – William Cassidy purchases 138 acres from Robert Nesbitt¹⁰ This deed is for a strip of land on the western side of William's property. This was land originally acquired in a crown grant of 350 acres by George Baxter in 1819, and 75 acres of which William purchased in 1824. The remaining 275 acres was purchased by Robert Nesbitt from Ralph Jarvis of Saint John in March of 1850. It has not been researched how this 275 acres was transferred from George Baxter to Ralph Jarvis. William purchased 138 acres from Robert Nesbitt which was one half of the property which Nesbitt had purchased from Jarvis. This deed is the first document in which the lake has a name and is referred to as Sidiques Lake. This purchase brought the total size of William's property to its largest extent of 596 acres.

March 30, 1852 – William Cassidy sells 3 lots totaling 105 acres to the Kirkpatricks and Henry Cripps William Kirkpatrick, Sr. purchased 62½ acres for £20, and William Kirkpatrick, Jr. 32½ acres for £20. Henry Cripps purchased 10 acres for £5. We wonder if there is any connection between Henry Cripps and the circuit rider James Cripps who encouraged Francis Edward Cassidy to build the church in 1882.

July 1, 1867 – Confederation of Canada New Brunswick, Nova Scotia, Quebec and Ontario become Canadian provinces. At this time the currency of New Brunswick changed from pounds (£) to dollars (\$).

September 24, 1868 – William Cassidy transfers 250 acres to son Francis Edward¹¹ This deed transfers ownership of a section of William's property to Francis Edward Cassidy totaling 250 acres. In this agreement, the lake is named DeForest Lake. The deed says the fee paid was \$2,000 implying it was not a gift from William to his son

Francis Edward. Because this transaction was some 18 years before William died, our speculation is that this transaction was essentially an agreement for Francis Edward to take care of William in his later years.

February 24, 1872 – William Cassidy sells 80 acres to William Kirkpatrick The price paid for this land was \$240.

September 16, 1875 – Francis Edward Cassidy acquires 80 acres by way of mortgage from William Kirkpatrick In this transaction, Francis Edward buys back the 80 acres sold to William Kirkpatrick by William three years earlier.

1883 – Cassidy Lake Church constructed

March 26, 1886 – William Cassidy dies at age 89

June 3, 1890 – Francis Edward Cassidy transfers church property to the Methodist Church¹² The property described in this agreement was transferred to the Methodist church on June 3, 1890. Included in this agreement are the cemetery and an access road between the church and the cemetery. A copy of this agreement is in the possession of Brian Cassidy. This property is New Brunswick land PID 152413.¹³

c1920 – Francis Edward Cassidy transfers property to son Robert Allen

October 25, 1927 – Francis Edward Cassidy dies at age 93

1952 – Robert Allen Cassidy transfers part of property to son Leslie Gordon This area was 125 acres or approximately 40 per cent of the total Cassidy property.

1954 – Leslie Gordon Cassidy transfers part of his property to son Gordon This is New Brunswick land PID 00100016 (10 acres).

1954 – Leslie Gordon Cassidy transfers part of his property to son Douglas This is New Brunswick land PID 00100008 (115 acres)

1954 – Robert Allen Cassidy transfers property to son Stanley Bernard This is New Brunswick land PID 200766 (193 acres) and is essentially the same as the original property purchased by William Cassidy from Elijah Baxter January 3, 1823.

May 8, 1965 – Robert Allen Cassidy dies at age 86

May 6, 1993 – Stanley Bernard Cassidy dies at age 81 leaving the property to son Peter The will of Stanley Cassidy leaves his portion of the Cassidy Lake property to son Peter. This is New Brunswick PID

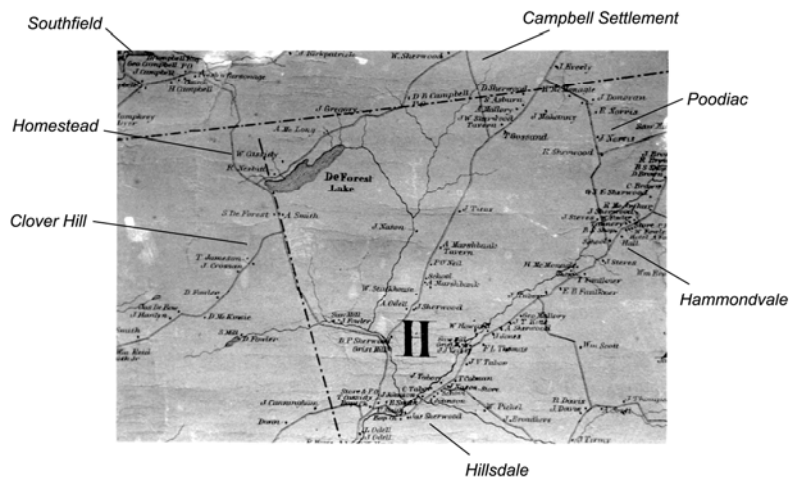


House 1912 before the porch was added

Cassidy Lake 1862

This map from 1862 covers a section of Kings County and shows an area approximately 5 miles (8 km) by 4 miles (6.5 km). This is the area bordered by today's towns of Southfield, Campbell Settlement, Poodiac, Hammondvale, Hillsdale, and Clover Hill. You can identify William and Jane's home (W Cassidy) and Cassidy Lake, which at the time of this map is called DeForest Lake. The neighbor to the west is R. Nesbitt and the east is A. McLong. On the road at the southwest is the home of S. DeForest, a witness to the contract for the homestead property (Appendix B). It is interesting to note (on a more readable version of this map) the various enterprises around the area: schools, churches, tavern, saw mill, post office, hotel, store, tannery, etc.

The lower center of the map is marked "Store & PO, T Cassidy and Bapt Ch." This is probably the home of William's son Thomas.

Name of the Lake

In the crown grants of 1815, the lake is unnamed. In the deeds of 1850, it is called Sidiques Lake. No doubt this has to do with the crown grants to James and William Sederquest. A New Brunswick map of 1862 shows the name as DeForest Lake as does the deed of September 24, 1868. The name was changed to Cassidy Lake after this date, likely between 1870 and 1889. The first known reference to the name Cassidy Lake is the 1890 church property transfer agreement. The search continues for information which formalizes these name changes.

Spelling of Names

Official New Brunswick Provincial Archive records show the name on the crown grant and petition as James DeCourey. The deed which transferred the property to Elijah Baxter is officially registered under the spelling DeCoursey. An inspection of the actual grant and petition (microfilm) showing James' own signature is inconclusive. James was of Irish ancestry and both spellings are in use although DeCourey appears to be the more common. An inspection of the actual deed (microfilm) text and James signature appears to show DeCoursey.

We have a similar problem with another spelling: Sederquist, Sederquest, Sidiques.

Farm

In the early years, the homestead at Cassidy Lake was almost a community in itself. Besides mixed farming that included the usual crops and livestock, there was also a grist mill, a saw mill, a cheese factory, a maple sugar camp, a church, and a cemetery. It was a family home and working farm until 1954 when Robert Allen retired. A fire, set by vandals, destroyed the house in 1972. The home has not been rebuilt. However, a detailed replica was constructed by Allen Robert Cassidy in 1980 for his granddaughter Anne Renwick Villeneuve [253] who, as of 1998, was residing in Toronto.

The aerial view on this page shows the home and farm buildings around 1950. The house was situated on a hill with a grand view overlooking the lake. It was a two story structure with four bedrooms upstairs and a kitchen, dining room, living room, and parlor downstairs.

Originally, there was a big fireplace. It was a room almost by itself and there were benches along the walls to sit on. Matthew Cassidy used to tell how he and his siblings would sit on these benches and study their lessons by the light of the fire. By the mid 1930s it had long been out of use, replaced by a large wood stove.

Each winter, the wood stove was moved from the kitchen into the dining room to provide much needed heat. The basement served as a dark, cool, dry place to store vegetables from the fall harvest. By the 1940s there was a wood furnace that let heat rise through a large metal grate in the floor of the front hall to heat the first floor. The heat would

continue to rise on up the stairway to the second story.

A long driveway wound up the steep hill from the main road and passed between the house and barn. The close proximity of the two buildings made it easy to do the daily chores in the barn, such as milking the cows. Connected to the back of the house was a woodshed which had one side open to the driveway. This was where the split wood was stored for the furnace and kitchen stove. Behind the house, accessible via the wood shed, was a chicken coop. The woodshed also had room for the single-horse wagon with its 45-gallon (170 l) wooden barrel of water for drinking and washing.

There was no running water in the house or barn. Water was hauled twice a day from the lake. In the winter, a sled was used to draw water from a fast-running stream on the property that seldom froze over. This was also where the livestock were taken for water in the winter. In the 1920s a well was dug in the yard near the woodshed, but it was never satisfactory. There was no electricity on the farm. In the late 1940s a wind-powered generator was installed on a tower on the roof of the barn that charged a car battery. This provided 6 volt lighting in the house and barn. This electrical system was used primarily for work after dark in the barn, especially during the winter months. The electric light, though dim, was much safer than the flame of oil lanterns around dry hay.

The frame for the barn, which was approximately 100 feet (30 m) long, was shaped by axe in the woods, brought to the site, and assembled with wooden pins. Boards were made by placing a log over a

pit and sawing by hand with a six-foot-long (1.8 m) tapered-width saw (6 inches (15 cm) at the ends, 8 inches (20 cm) at the center, with upright handles at each end). Two people were needed to operate the saw. One stood outside the pit and grasped one end of the saw; the other person stood inside the pit and held the other end of the saw. This saw was also used for cutting blocks of ice from the lake in the winter. To cut the ice, one handle was removed from the saw. The blocks were then stored in the ice house for use during the summer.

By the 1940s, the barn was actually three attached buildings: a workshop, an ice house, and the main barn building. The workshop was necessary for repairing farm equipment and making the essentials for daily living on the farm. Inside the workshop, there was, in addition to the benches, tools, and boxes of screws, bolts, and nails, a stone grinding wheel that was used to sharpen the knives, scythes, and mower blades. On the second floor of the workshop there was a large foot-driven wood lathe used in furniture making. The ice house, which had about six feet of sawdust with hay on top of that, stored one-foot-thick (0.3 m) blocks of ice cut from the lake in the winter. It was insulated enough for the ice to last all summer. Milk and cream were seldom stored in the ice house since there was always a fresh warm supply from the twice daily milking of the cows. In those days, people enjoyed drinking warm milk.

The walk-in entry to the main barn building was through the workshop, up a slight incline, and past a two-hole outhouse. Upon entering the barn, there were the cattle stalls on the south side. There were about 25 of them, nearly all of which would be filled in winter.

Livestock could not survive outside during the winter when snow covered the frozen ground and temperatures regularly dropped to between -20 and -30 degrees Fahrenheit (-29 and -34 degrees Celsius). About 15 of the cows were for milking. At the far end of the barn adjacent to the cattle stalls were pens for the calves and a few pigs. Beneath the cattle stalls was the manure shed which provided fertilizer for the fields in the spring. Immediately on the left upon entering the barn was the horse stable with stalls for four horses. Next was a hay storage area called the mow. In the center of the side wall were two large double doors which opened to the yard. The doorway was large enough for a loaded hay wagon to enter to have its hay pitched into the mow. The center area of the barn is also where the animals were slaughtered. Next to this was an additional hay storage area and then finally a room where the milk was separated. The separator was a hand-cranked centrifugal device which separated the cream from the milk. The skim milk was fed to the calves and the cream was sent to a creamery.

Detached and next to the ice house was a single-car garage where the family car was kept. It was a two-story building with a storage area upstairs.

Church

William Cassidy was clearly a religious man. He and Jane were Church of Ireland (Anglican) which was the predominant religion where they grew up in County Donegal. It's worth noting that historically, the Cassidys were Catholic. This fact is well documented in County Fermanagh. Thus William Cassidy would have had a Catholic heritage. Adoption of the protestant faith may have been a desire by the family somewhere along the way to fit into the English mainstream.

Around 1830, William and Jane, wanting a good religious upbringing for their twelve children, became Methodists and opened their home to the Circuit Riders of the Sussex Circuit. Services were held in the Cassidy home and the minister always stayed overnight.

In the 1800s, members of the Methodist church were formed into small companies, called classes, which met weekly for religious conferences and devotional exercises. The members of each class had their names enrolled in a class-book, and each member had a society ticket. This society ticket was renewed quarterly in December, March, June and September. These society tickets were needed to gain entrance to many Methodist services. In large circuits, the renewal of tickets

added greatly to the preacher's labor. William Cassidy received a society ticket in 1831 so there is no question that he was serious about his religion.

By the 1880s the head of the Cassidy household had passed to William's seventh son, Francis Edward. Around 1882, Circuit Rider James Cripps, who we understand Francis Edward thought highly of, gathered people together and convinced Francis Edward to build a church.

So, construction began. Timber was hewn for its construction from the properties of John Jameison, Francis Edward Cassidy, and others. The lumber from this timber was sawn on a water-driven up-and-down saw mill, then hauled to Upham where it was planed. This lumber was used for flooring and ash sheeting around the walls.

Ash, cut by Francis Edward himself, formed the main part of the pulpit, while the front part was built of wood salvaged from the wreck of the H.M.S. Royal George, a man-of-war of the nineteenth century. This wood was brought from England by Joseph Robinson of Norton.

The ends of the pews were purchased from Portland Street Methodist Church in Saint John. The main pews, window sashes, pulpit, chair, etc. were all constructed by Francis Edward himself.

When first built, the interior of the church was plastered. However in 1911, the interior was redecorated in metal plating and the ceiling painted sky blue and the walls pink. These colors prevail today.

Francis Edward framed the church and his father, William, who would have been 86 years old, did the clapboarding. Francis Edward's wife, Jennie, cooked meals for the workers.

In 1883, the church was dedicated as the Clover Hill Methodist Church. The church and cemetery were deeded to the Methodist Church June 3, 1890.

The first minister actually came from Upham. The first minister from the local area was Rev. John B. Goff of Sussex. Some of those that followed him included:

- Rev. Eddie Shanklin, 1903
- Rev. Soddon of Belleisle, 1918
- Rev. Shanklin again in 1921
- Rev. Fulton
- Rev. Roger Pepper
- Rev. Bill Pepper, Roger's son
- Rev. Linton
- Rev. Dalzell
- Rev. Ben Turner
- Rev. Leonard J. Watson
- Rev. Wass
- Rev. Charles Cambdin
- Rev. Matthew Knight, who was absent minded.
- Rev. Clarke and his horse Daisy.
- Rev. Buchanan who had curly hair.
- Rev. Harry Marr from Norton.
- Rev. Thomas who liked to smoke, but was careful to do so where Francis Edward would not see him.

By 1949 the structure was showing its age and a major renovation was undertaken including a new foundation, a new roof, and a fresh



coat of paint both inside and out. It's worthy of mention that Matthew Cassidy [54] who completed this renovation of the exterior and interior, also worked as a boy on the original construction in 1883.

The dedication was a big celebration that drew people from as far away as Boston. The service on that September day in 1949 was led by Rev. Eddie Shanklin. The same Rev. Shanklin who had first preached here 46 years earlier in 1903 and had also conducted the funeral service of Francis Edward in 1927. At the rededication in 1949, the church was renamed The Francis Edward Cassidy Memorial Church in memory of its founder.

The dedication of the church on September 25, 1949 was also cause for a great reunion of the Cassidy family. This reunion became an annual affair hosted by Robert Allen Cassidy and his wife Edythe until 1954. Less formal reunions and services continue to be held every year on or about the first Sunday in August. The format is simple, a church service at 2:00 pm followed by a picnic. Both family and visitors are welcome. Families bring sandwiches and refreshments sufficient for themselves plus extra to share. There is always plenty of food. Stan Cassidy made the arrangements until his death in 1993. Since then, Andy and Hazel Douthwright have done the organizing. In addition to coordinating the event, the Douthwrights clean the church and maintain the cemetery.

The first few reunions were recorded on 16mm color movie film by Stan Cassidy. The film captured pictures of the homestead, church, and many family members. These film clips were combined into a single 30 minute film, converted to video tape, and annotated by Stan as a video record of that era. Brian Cassidy has the video tape master. In

2004 the film was converted to digital media, edited and made available on the Cassidy family genealogy website www.cassidys.ca.

Regular Sunday services were held here for 71 years, until 1954 when Robert Allen Cassidy retired from farming and moved to live with his oldest son, Stan in Fredericton.

The church we see in 2006 is as it was in 1949. The only things missing are the pot-belly stove that provided much needed heat in the winter, lights, and the pump organ. The organ was purchased from Sam Freeman, agent for the manufacturer and the father of Edythe Freeman Cassidy [119], for the sum of \$85. The lights were from the church in Newtown, Kings County and were installed at the same time as the organ.

In the 1970s the stove and chimney were removed when a steel roof was installed. The pump organ had deteriorated to the point that it became unplayable and so was removed with the thought of refurbishing it. That however was found to be too costly. The church continues to be maintained by the Cassidy family with the help of friends and neighbors in the Cassidy Lake area.

We have no formal records of church activities such as baptisms, weddings and funerals. We do know of at least three weddings. Andy and Hazel Douthwright were married here in 1972, and then in 1997, Harvey and Denise McDonald, and on Sept. 25, 2005 Andy and Hazel Douthwright's son. On August 17, 2003, Lillian Mary Para [1067], a 7th generation descendant of William and Jane, was baptized.

Cheese Factory

The Clover Hill Cheese Factory, as it was called, was located on the lake just west of the church and opened in 1902. Owned by the Cassidy brothers, the first year it received 376,360 lbs of milk. Income was \$3820.30 and expenses \$483.33. The average price of cheese was 9½ ¢ per lb. The average price paid for milk was \$0.88 per 100 lbs.

Fred Price was the first manager. Allen Cassidy was manager of the factory from 1904. How long the cheese factory remained in production we do not know. It was at least initially successful by virtue of a note in the Kings County Record that from May to November 1906 the factory paid out between \$5,000 and \$6,000 to the farmers of the area. The cheese factory was not operational in 1939 and by 1949 all that remained were the foundation beams.

Cemetery

The cemetery is located on the farm within easy reach of the house. It sits on a grassy knoll. In earlier days there was a clear view of the lake and the house. However, the lake has not been visible since about 2000 due to extensive tree growth around the cemetery.

The cemetery was deeded to the Methodist Church together with a 10 foot right-of-way to the lake road by Francis Edward Cassidy in 1890. The plot plan in Appendix A is an updated version of the one hanging in the church.

From a plan drawn by Allen R. Cassidy on November 6, 1950 we note that the original burial ground was 80 ft x 48 ft and that it was expanded to 156 ft x 100 ft. The expanded burial ground map was approved by R. Allen Cassidy and S.B. Cassidy.

3. Cassidy People

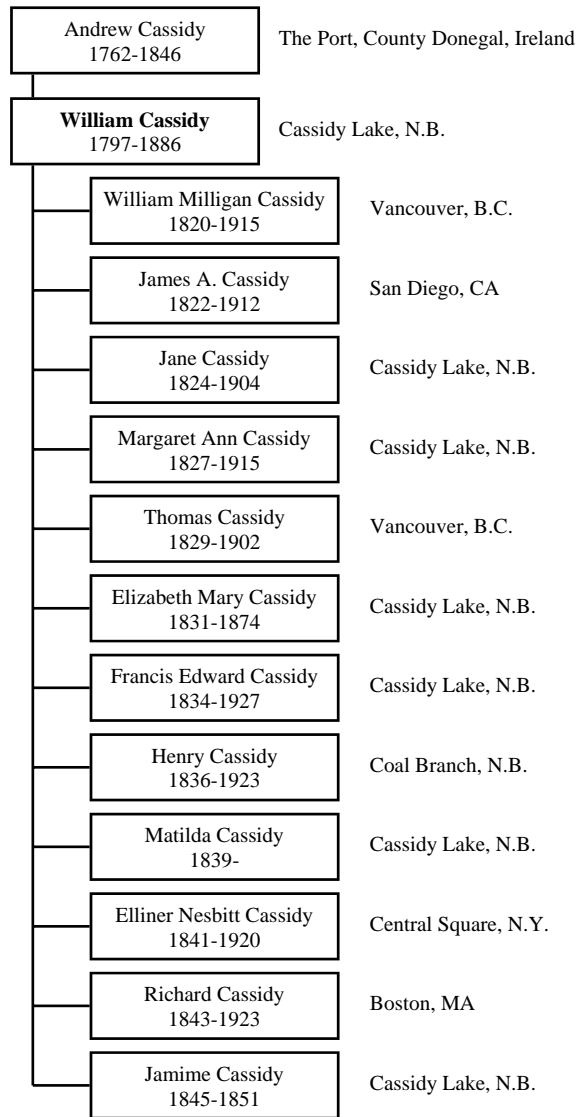
From its beginnings at Cassidy Lake in 1825, the Cassidy family grew and rapidly settled throughout Canada and the United States. Only a few branches of the family have remained in the New Brunswick area. Scanning the genealogies of William's descendants, one is struck by how mobile these people were. We can see that New England (Boston area) was a common destination especially in the winter when there was little employment in New Brunswick. Cassidys also soon found their way west to British Columbia. This appears to have been a destination of choice from New Brunswick as we have found no sign that they settled anywhere in between. By the late 1800s we find Cassidy Lake descendants in Minnesota and Montana. By the early 1900s they are in California and Washington State on the west coast, and Washington, DC and Florida on the east coast.

The Cassidys have shown themselves to be energetic, entrepreneurial, and benevolent. In the early days, they were master craftsmen in furniture and cabinet making. This skill has been passed to several generations, though not widely exploited commercially. Occupations in later years do not follow any particular pattern. You will find Cassidys in all fields of endeavor.

Andrew Cassidy (1762-1846)

Andrew Cassidy [15], William Cassidy's father, is as far back as we have been able to trace the genealogy. All we know of Andrew are his dates, his marriage to Margaret Nesbitt in 1793, and their ten children.

Mike Cassidy believes Andrew and Margaret are buried in the old Church of Ireland cemetery in the Village of Inver at the mouth of the Eany River.¹ This cemetery is very difficult to find now. The ruins of the Cassidy cottage, which Michael saw many years before 1999 on a visit to The Port, has disappeared. In its place now is a depot for a salmon fish farm.

In addition to the eldest son, William, we know that sons Frank, Robert, Thomas and Andrew also came to America and arrived in Saint John, N.B. or New England. We understand that Robert, Andrew and Thomas settled in the Boston area but we have so far not been successful in tracing their family trees.

Maureen Waddington Cassidy [601], Mike Cassidy's wife, in her research in the church library in Dublin in 1999, found a Francis Cassidy, b. 1730 and d. 1821, who may be the father of Andrew Cassidy.

William Cassidy (1797-1886)

William Cassidy [1] was clearly a self-confident individual. Newly married, he left home at age 22 for an undeveloped and distant land. At age 28 we find him contracting for a large tract of property on which to establish a homestead. By his late 30s he's taking the initiative to support the development of the religious community at Cassidy Lake including obtaining a society ticket from the Methodist church.

The oldest of ten children, William was born in The Port, Parish of Inver, County Donegal, Ireland on March 4, 1797. His wife, Jane Milligan, was also born in The Port on June 22, 1798.² The story goes that they eloped on May 20, 1818 to Gretna Green, Scotland. The village blacksmith performed the wedding ceremony over an anvil. After her marriage, Jane, whose family were upper class land owners, was disowned by her family.³

The problem with this story is that Mike Cassidy found the Church of Ireland records for the Parish of Inver showing their marriage on May 25, 1818. Mike speculates that perhaps William and Jane did elope to Gretna Green, but returned home to be legally married in the church.

We have no knowledge of William or Jane's education. Based on the fact that William signed his name on the land contracts with good penmanship indicates he was quite literate. Jane, on the other hand, signed her name with an "X" prior to 1870. The 1872 deed with William Kirkpatrick has a proper signature for her. At this point, Jane is 75 years old.

During one of his visits to Ireland, Mike Cassidy learned that it was common in the early 1800s for ships to drop anchor in Donegal harbor (7 miles from The Port) and send out word that they were taking passengers to the U.S. or Canada. They would stay in the harbor for a week or so until they were full, then set off. Given this activity, travel to America would be common knowledge for people living around The Port.

William and Jane went to Derry, Ireland where they took a ship to Canada. On September 1, 1819 they landed in Saint John, New Brunswick where they purchased a piece of land which is now at the head of King Street where the Woolworth store was located in 1970s.⁴

While in Saint John, William was engaged in ship building. After being given a grant of land at Shepody, New Brunswick (of which we know nothing except that it was unsatisfactory), he moved there and lived alone in a log hut while his family remained in Saint John. In 1823 the family moved to the south side of Cassidy Lake, where they resided until 1825 when they moved to a 150 acre (61 ha) parcel of land on the north side of the lake. They acquired this farm by selling their land in Saint John. William had to walk a distance of 100 miles (160 km) to Fredericton, the capital of the province, to acquire the land. He did this in the winter when the rivers and lakes were frozen so he could cross them. With only a primitive compass to guide him and a flint-lock, muzzle-loading gun to protect him, he undertook the journey through the forests.

After settling on the north side of Cassidy Lake, Jane would paddle across the lake to the site of their former home where there was a pasture for the family's only cow. Once while crossing the lake in October 1825, she became lost in a dense smoke which had drifted over the lake from a large forest fire along the Mirimichi River - some 125 airline miles (200 km) north. Her husband guided her safely to shore by blowing a seashell horn. This same shell horn was later used as a dinner horn by Stan Cassidy and is now (1998) in his son Bruce's possession.

The life style of William and Jane is typical of a farm family of that period. Candles made of tallow, salvaged and remolded continually, supplied light for their home. A fireplace built of field stone served as the only heating device. Cast iron pots hooked on iron cranes were used for cooking over the fire. For bread, they grew and ground the wheat and baked the bread in a cast iron dish buried in the bed of coals at the bottom of the fireplace. The family's clothing was made from homespun cloth woven on hand looms. William was a master craftsman in the making of these hand looms.

Although it was some 30 miles (48 km) away, Saint John was

their center of supply. Roads in New Brunswick at this time were poor to non-existent. They would travel to the city by horseback along a path cut in the dense forest. On the return journey, the load would be packed on the horse's back while the rider walked. An idea of the hazards faced by these people may be obtained from the story of William defending himself with a heavy cross-cut saw when he accidentally surprised a mother bear and her cubs.

William died on March 26, 1886, eleven years after his wife who had died on January 7, 1875. Both are buried in the cemetery on the Cassidy farm at Cassidy Lake.

As noted earlier, William was a religious man. He and Jane were Anglican, stemming from their Church of Ireland upbringing. When William was in his late 30s, they became Methodists and opened their home to the Circuit Riders. From then on the ministers all came to William's home and held services. The ministers always stayed overnight. This meant a lot of house cleaning and polishing of the tableware. The following excerpt from a memorial service given by J.C. [full name unknown] gives us a sense of how serious William was about his religion:

It was under the preaching of some of the Wesleyan Methodist preachers on the Sussex circuit that he [William Cassidy] was led to Christ. When referring to this charge, he used to say, "God was pleased to send some of the Wesleyan preachers to Sussex, whom I had the pleasure of hearing. Thank God that he brought me to see that I was a sinner, and that nothing but faith in Jesus Christ could save me. Thank God for his mercy to me in plucking me as a brand out of the fire." Bro. Cassidy received a society ticket from Rev. P. Bent in Sept. 1831.

While Williams' son, Francis Edward, gets the credit for building the church on the family property, William helped with the construction and would have been fully supportive of the project.

Francis Edward Cassidy (1834-1927)

Francis Edward [9] was the seventh of William's twelve children. He inherited the homestead property from his father. Why Francis Edward was chosen over the others we do not know. However, he certainly proved himself to be a worthy recipient of this family trust.

Life on the farm was never easy. The land is at best suitable for mixed farming, i.e. a little of everything. But like his father before him, Francis Edward was able to enjoy a respectable, middle-class living. The family dressed well, loaned money to others in the community, and

had enough disposable income to acquire such modern conveniences as an automobile. Some of this income undoubtedly came from his carpentry work at which he was a master craftsman. The cheese factory at Cassidy Lake was established during his time and it would be a fair guess that he was behind establishing this enterprise.

Francis Edward's most notable contribution to the family legacy was the construction of the "little white" church on the family property in 1883. This contribution was formally recognized in 1949 when it was rededicated in his memory as the Francis Edward Cassidy Memorial Church. To say that he was active in the church would be an understatement. The remarks in 1949 by Rev. Shanklin—who knew Francis Edward very well, acknowledged this:

Mr. Cassidy was for years a local preacher in the Methodist Church. Many times did he visit the sick and the dying and read the scripture and pray with them. He was a member of the Official Board and again and again he attended conferences as the appointed delegate.

His generosity was exemplary. Francis Edward always gave to the church. In fact money went to the church that was often really needed at home. He went to the Church Conference every year. Once a month when the minister came, benches were carried into the sitting room to make it ready for the meeting. They never knew when he was coming. A Franklin stove in the front room kept clothes warm for the minister. The Circuit Rider period lasted about 10 years.

Harry Cassidy (1900-1951)

Harry Morris Cassidy (1900-1951) [310] was a labor economist and became a leader in the development of social policy in Canada throughout his active career as an academic and public servant. After graduating from the University of British Columbia, he received a Ph.D. from the Brookings Institute in Washington, D.C. This led to appointments at the University of North Carolina, Rutgers, University of California (Berkeley), and the University of Toronto.

He was a member of The League for Social Reconstruction. In the early 1930s he was a contributor to the Regina Manifesto which led to the formation of the CCF party in 1934. As Deputy Minister of Health and Welfare in British Columbia from 1934-39, he piloted the development of the first health insurance program in Canada.

Harry was Dean of the School of Social Work at the University of California (Berkeley) from 1939-45. He then returned to Canada to lead the newly established graduate program in social work at the University of Toronto.

As a consultant to the Canadian government, he was one of the authors of the first federal family allowance program introduced in 1948. Internationally recognized, he served with the United Nations Relief and Rehabilitation Association in 1944 and as a welfare

consultant to the Egyptian government in 1949. Just prior to his death in 1951, he ran (almost successfully) for leadership of the Ontario Liberal Party. Harry Cassidy was a social activist who was ahead of his time.

Henry Cassidy (1910-1988)

Henry Cassidy (1910-1988) [475] was a Harvard graduate and a very successful journalist. He was fluent in Russian and French and served as the Associated Press bureau chief in Moscow from 1940 to 1944. During that period he became Joseph Stalin's first and most

publicized pen pal. He also lived in the Maginot Line with the French Army until Paris fell in June 1940. He was made a Chevalier in the French Foreign Legion of Honor.

Stan Cassidy (1912-1993)

Stanley Bernard Cassidy (1912-1993) [120] was born and raised on the homestead and settled in Fredericton, N.B. Besides being a successful businessman in the electrical contracting field, he made a significant contribution to the New Brunswick community.

Stan was a community minded individual always looking for ways to improve life for the people of the province. On a trip to Mexico in the early 1950s, he got the idea to establish a rehabilitation facility for the physically handicapped. His goal was to help people with disabilities improve their quality of life and enable them to be contributing members of society. This was no small undertaking. In addition to the cost, his background was in engineering not medicine.

Never one to be deterred from a challenge, through dedication, perseverance, and the help of similar minded people in the community, his dream was realized. In 1957 the Forest Hill Rehabilitation Centre was opened in Fredericton.

Ensuring the ongoing success of the “Rehab”, as it is locally

called, was a passion for Stan. For 36 years he stayed closely involved in every aspect, from hiring new medical staff and procuring major medical equipment, to guiding advanced research programs in cooperation with the biomedical engineering department at the University of New Brunswick. That effort paid off. The “Rehab” flourished and gained a reputation for innovation and quality care.

He also established a number of gas stations (called Rehab Showcases) that were operated by handicapped persons recovering from disabilities. In recognition of his work, in 1984 he was awarded the Therese Casgrain Award by the Government of Canada. In 1987 he was appointed to the Order of Canada, the country’s highest distinction for its citizens. In 1994 the center was renamed the Stan Cassidy Centre for Rehabilitation in his memory.

When he died in 1993, the Rehab was seriously overcrowded and he was preparing to launch a major building campaign. With his passing, there was concern whether the centre would survive without the guiding hand of its founder. In 2006 that question was answered with the opening of a new \$28 million, 59,400 sq ft, state-of-the-art facility, twice the size of the original facility. His legacy continues.

4. Researching in Ireland

One of the challenges in constructing the family history is to expand the knowledge of the family roots in Ireland. Fortunately, the Irish are well organized to assist people with genealogical research. There is a good 72-page booklet, *Tracing Your Irish Roots* by Christine Kinealy. It has useful information on where to look and what to expect and is widely available in Ireland. Genealogical research is becoming easier as historical data in Ireland becomes more widely available through the Internet. Most of the records of interest are in Dublin. Some however, are in Belfast. There has been fairly good record keeping since the 1700s. The challenge is to find those records. Many records prior to about 1850 were lost in a fire in the archives building in Dublin in 1922. However, there is always the possibility that other copies of the information still exist. We are constantly amazed at the information uncovered about the Cassidy family in Ireland. We've also found it pays to revisit sources that have been checked before. As our knowledge of the family grows, information that originally seemed unimportant can become quite relevant.

Since William Cassidy came to Canada from The Port in County Donegal that location and the 1700-1800s time period is the primary focus for our research.

The towns of importance are Mountcharles and Dunkineely. Mountcharles, on the road from Donegal Town to Killybegs, had a population of 508 in 1821. Today it is probably about 1500.

Gathering Our History

Ellsworth Cassidy in 1998 and Mike Cassidy in 1999 separately identified William's parents and siblings in Ireland.

Peter and Gwen Cassidy visited Ireland in 1995, 2000 and 2005 and did research on the Cassidy family roots. In Dublin, they spent time in the National Library and the National Archives. In County Donegal, they toured the Inver area, explored church cemeteries, and talked to a pleasant elderly resident, Mrs. Annabelle Cassidy, who lived about a quarter of a mile (0.4 km) from the Inver Methodist church of which she was a member. Her address is Mullanboys, Mountcharles, Co. Donegal, Republic of Ireland. It used to be Inver. She has lived in the house since 1939. Her husband, George Oliver Cassidy, died in 1984 at the age of 89. He is buried in the Inver Church of Ireland cemetery about a half mile (0.8 km) down the road because the Methodist church does not have a cemetery.

Peter and Gwen searched church cemeteries from Mountcharles to Killybegs for Cassidy tombstones. They found a few, mainly in Church of Ireland cemeteries. Very few Cassidys were found in the Catholic cemeteries. Also, there were few graves prior to about 1850. One wonders if the people who died before 1850 were generally buried on the farm.

Ellsworth Cassidy visited Ireland in October 1996 and he too visited with Mrs. Annabelle Cassidy in Mullanboys. She sent him to see

G. Jim (Jimmy) Henderson who had a hardware store located on the diamond in Donegal town that he had turned over to his son David. David took Ellsworth to his home where his father Jimmy lives. Ellsworth describes Jimmy as a most talented man, a couple of years younger than himself. Jimmy and Annabelle are descendants of Mary Cassidy b. 1854. Mike Cassidy feels Mary Cassidy is likely related to our William through one of his sisters but cannot draw a definitive link.

The Henderson family lived next to the Cassidy stone cottage in The Port in the early 1800s and married into the Cassidy family. The two older Hendersons, Jimmy and George, both in their 80s (1999) live in the vicinity of Donegal Town. They are cousins of Annabelle Cassidy of Mullanboys.

National Library in Dublin

In the National Library Peter and Gwen searched through the Catholic records of births, marriages, and deaths for the Diocese of Raphoe, Parish of Inver. These records are for the period from approximately 1845 to 1880. They found 15 Cassidy birth references dating from 1867 to 1880 written in Gaelic. No references to Milligan, William's wife's family, were found in the records for the Parish of Inver.

National Archives in Dublin

At the National Archives in Dublin, Peter and Gwen found several Cassidys referenced in the Griffith Valuation of 1848 and in the Tithe Applotment of 1823. The Tithe Applotment book is essentially a property tax record organized by parish and townland. No references to Milligan were found. But there was a Melligan. Based on these records, it is believed that the townlands most likely to yield Cassidy family roots are Killybegs, Hoase Park, Kilmacredden, and Port Parks.

The townlands of Hoase Park and Port Parks could not be found on the survey maps of Ireland. They were clearly in the Parish of Inver in 1823 as shown by their mention in the historical records, but they no longer exist as townlands by those names. The Port townland near Inver existed then as it does today. There is no Mt. Charles in the Parish of Inver. There is a Mountcharles though, which seems to often be spelled Mount Charles.

Other sources checked in the National Archives were the Will Extracts of Office of Charitable Donations records, the Pre-1708 Deeds index, the Crossle Abstract index, the Marriage License index for the Diocese of Raphoe 1740-1755 and 1817-1830, the Wills Records (Diocesan), the Index of Diocesan Administrative Book, the list of Finian Suspects, the list of Prisoners Petitions, and the Manuscript Sources for the History of Irish Civilization. In these references there were several Cassidy references but no Milligan or Melligan.

The Religious Census of 1776 is available for the Diocese of Raphoe. There are some interesting notes in the sixteen pages of text about the religious leanings of the residents. Apparently the minister, John Wilson, saw a decline in Protestantism. There are no Cassidy references in these census records. The documents, however, appear to be incomplete.

Church of Ireland Parish Records

The Church of Ireland parish records are available in the Representative Church Body Library in Dublin. These documents were not searched by Peter and Gwen, however Mike and Maureen Cassidy have shown that there are valuable records there relating to the Cassidy family. The library has four volumes on file for the Diocese of Raphoe covering baptisms 1805-1871, marriages 1805-1845, and deaths 1827-1875.

Roots of Jane Milligan

Despite extensive research in the Donegal area, no trace was found of Jane Milligan or her family. This is strange as she is reported to have been born in The Port and to a family important enough to own land. There are virtually no Milligans in the area which leads to suspicion that she was probably from an area to the east where Ellsworth Cassidy believes there are many Milligans.

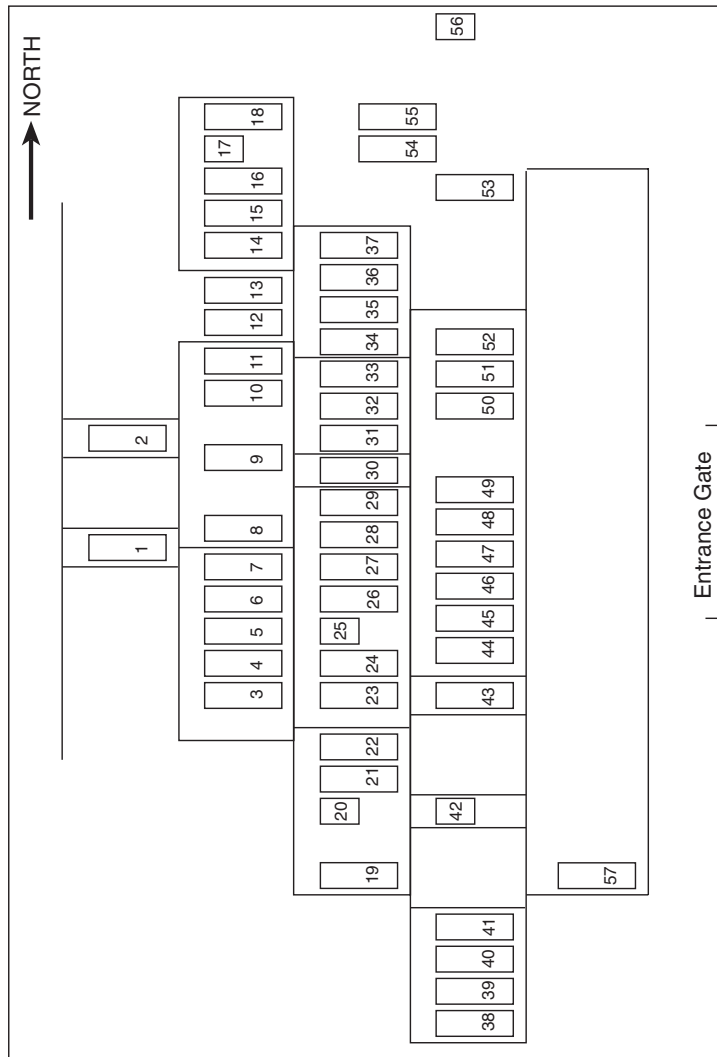
However, because this was Andrew's church the grave may simply be lost or he and his wife may be buried in the new Church of Ireland cemetery.

- 2 Of the family of Jane Milligan, we know only that they were upper class land owners. From an obituary notice found in the Saint John library, we know that she was the youngest daughter and her father, James Milligan, was from County Donegal, Ireland and died prior to 1875.
3. This story is problematic since we have yet to find any record of a Milligan owning land in County Donegal. Jim Henderson of Donegal related a different story about William to Ellsworth Cassidy in 1996. He said William was insulted or something by the land owner he worked for who was named Nesbitt. So he hit Nesbitt across the face with a stick. The man almost bled to death. One wonders if this may have been the reason for leaving Ireland.
4. In checking the record of ship arrivals in Saint John, we believe it is likely that William and Jane arrived on August 30, 1819. The New Brunswick Courier newspaper was published weekly and showed all ship arrivals for the previous week in the Marine Journal section. The Sept. 4, 1819 issue shows two ships arriving in Saint John on Monday, August 30 from Londonderry. (1) the Lord Wellington, Mitchell, Londonderry, 39 days — W. Black, 64 passengers; (2) Haywood, Henderson, Londonderry, 40 days — J. Ewing & Co., 140 passengers. To determine which of these two ships William and Jane were on would require the passenger lists (also known as muster lists). All attempts to locate such lists have failed as they were most certainly lost in a series of New Brunswick Customs House fires during the 19th century. We have not researched records in Ireland where there would have been a duplicate copy. Many such lists were transferred to England and destroyed after World War II as a cost saving measure.

There is a less than accurate report of William and Jane Cassidy on page 90 of this book. A romance it might have been but there is no evidence that William was a weaver or that Jane's family were of landed gentry.

Appendix B

1823 Contract for Cassidy Lake Property

THIS INDENTURE made this third day of January in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and twenty three, between Elijah Baxter yeoman of the Parish of Norton in the County of Kings and Province of New Brunswick of the one part and William Cassidy carpenter of the Parish of Sussex in the County and Province aforesaid. Witnesseth that the said Elijah Baxter do engage to sell unto the said William Cassidy a certain Tract of Land for the sum of forty Pounds of New Brunswick fronted as follows; 40 Rods on Elijah Baxter and 30 Rods on Land granted to George Baxter from thence to extend back to complete the amount of 150 Acres. The said Sum of forty Pounds the said Elijah Baxter do agree to take out in Carpenter's Work in the specific time of six years, but the last four years the said William Cassidy do agree to pay the said Elijah Baxter with Interest. The said William Cassidy do engage to give the said Elijah Baxter carpenter's work to the amount of six Pounds and fifteen Shillings annually to the end of the six years viz: to the year 1830 which work is to be performed in a workmanlike manner. But if the said William Cassidy can perform the work required by Elijah Baxter in a less given time, then the said William Cassidy shall be at full liberty to demand of the said Elijah Baxter a good and warranty deed, in which the said Elijah Baxter do bind himself, his heirs administrators or assigns for the fulfilment of the same as soon as the said William Cassidy shall have performed the above conditions - And the said William Cassidy do bind himself, his heirs administrators, or assigns for the fulfilment of the written stipulations. Elijah Baxter and William Cassidy, each and both of them, do severally for themselves do bind themselves in the Sum of One hundred fifty Pounds of New Brunswick Currency on the non-performance of the above contract. In Witness whereof the said Elijah Baxter has set his hand and seal this 3rd day of January 1823.

Appendix C

Church Property Transfer

The following is a transcript of the agreement to transfer the church property from Francis Edward Cassidy to the Methodist Church. This is an unsigned document. We assume that it was executed as written on June 3, 1890. No attempt has been made to correct any typing errors in the original document.

This Indenture made this third day of June in the year of Our Lord one thousand eight hundred and ninety and in pursuance of the Acts of Parliament and the General Assembly in such case made and provided. Between Francis Edward Cassidy, the elder, of the parish of Hammond in the County of Kings and province on New Brunswick, farmer, and _____ his wife, of the first part and "The Trustees of the Clover Hill Methodist Church at Cassidy's Lake in the parish of Hammond Kings County in their corporate capacity and hereinafter referred to as "The Trustees" of the second part.

Witneseth that the said parties hereto of the first part in consideration of the sum of five dollars of lawful money of Canada to them now paid, the receipt whereof is hereby acknowledged do grant, bargain, and sell unto the said "The Trustees" their associates successors and assigns the following described lots of land namely:

First. All that certain lot of land situate in said parish of Hammond and described as follows, namely: Beginning at a Cedar stake (marked A) on the North Shore of Cassidy's (formerly DeForest's) Lake and distant (37½) thirty seven and one half rods Easterly from the point of intersection of Robert Nesbitts Easterly line with said Northerly shore of the said lake, thence running Northwardly four and one half rods or to the highway road from said lake to the new line road to Sussex, thence along the Southern side line of said road Easterly ten rods, thence Southerly three rods to the said Northerly side of said lake, thence following the course of said Northerly shore of said lake Westwardly ten rods or to the place of beginning, being a portion of the lands described in an indenture made the twenty fourth day of September A.D. 1868 between William Cassidy of the onepart

and said Francis Edward Cassidy of the other part and registered in Book H No. 3, pages 19 and 20 of Records of Deeds for Kings County.

And secondly, All that other lot of land situate in said parish of Hammond and bounded as follows, namely: Beginning at a blazed Yellow Birch tree standing among stones on the Eastern bank of a brook running into Cassidy's (formerly DeForest's) lake and distant Easterly from Robert Nesbitt's East line twenty two and one half rods and from the highway from said lake to the New Line Road to Sussex following the courses of the road hereinafter referred to eighty seven and one half rods, thence Easterly three rods, to a stake, thence Southerly five rods to a stake, thence Westerly three rods to a bunch of spruce trees, thence Northerly five rods to a place of beginning to be used as a burying ground together with full and free right and liberty of way and passage for the said The Trustees their successors and assigns, their tenants, servants and others authorized by them with or without horses, carts and carriages of all descriptions over and along a piece of road leading from the said highway past the dwelling house of said Francis Edward Cassidy to said last above described lot and having a width of ten feet throughout.

Together also with all the estate right title interest dower and right of dower reversion and reversions remainder and remainders rents issues and profits property claim and demand whatsoever both at Law in Equity of the said parties hereto of the first part of in and to the same with the appurtenances.

TO HAVE AND TO HOLD the said hereditaments and premises hereby granted or expressed and intended so to be unto the said "The Trustees" in their corporate capacity, their associates and successors forever, upon trust, to hold, use, occupy and enjoy the same for the use and benefit of The Methodist Church at Cassidy's Lake in the parish of Hammond, Kings County aforesaid according to the rules usages doctrines and discipline of "The Methodist Church" and the trusts directions and provisions contained in an Act of Parliament of Canada, Chapter 106 and an Act of the General Assembly of this Province, Chapter 22 severally passed in the forty-seventh year of the reign of

Her Majesty Queen Victoria and respectively intituled “An Act respecting the Union of certain Methodist Churches therein named.

In Witness Whereof, the said parties hereto of the first part have hereto set their hands and seals respectively the day and year first above written.
